Highlights of 2018

New Initiative to Address Suicide and Depression

Central Kansas Mental Health Center (CKMHC) activated a new initiative to lower the rising suicide rate. Suicide is a community issue, touching almost everyone directly or indirectly, and requires a community response. The Centers for Disease Control states that suicide rates in Kansas increased 45%. The myth that talking about it can cause more risk has not been found to be true. **Talking about suicide saves lives.**

- CKMHC now offers Applied Suicide Intervention Skills and Training (ASIST); the most widely recognized, national and international, best practice in reducing suicide. Our certified ASIST Trainers offer this 2-day course to parents, the public, and professionals. It is designed to save more lives and provide skills and confidence to help individuals openly talk about suicide. It explores fears about suicide, teaches effective engagement with people who might have thoughts of suicide, and gives hands on practice to generate confidence using a method proven to help those struggling. It also focuses on self-care which is important for anyone trying to help others. Anyone can benefit from the tools gained from this class. We provide both onsite and offsite classes. Nursing and other CEUs are available. Please contact Ericka Lysell for details or to schedule a training.
- Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) is a 1-day curriculum that will equip the public to recognize at risk
 individuals and respond effectively. It also teaches how to intervene and when to seek treatment for a
 variety of behavioral and emotional issues. We provided twice as many classes in 2018.
- CKMHC offers free and confidential Depression & Anxiety Screenings for every community we serve.
 A brief screening assists in identifying symptoms indicating a need for professional service. Same day service is available for first time appointments to meet with a licensed therapist who can help to assess and develop a path forward that is person centered and individualized to one's preferences. One in four Kansans has a diagnosable mental illness, yet two out of every three people with mental health problems go without treatment.

Mental Health Services Now Offered In Schools

- School Based Therapy CKMHC offers partnerships to school districts. Onsite therapists in schools were increased by 60% last year. Of the schools that collected data, results were as follows: improved school attendance 83%, improved academic performance 76%, and improved behavior 94%.
- School based social-emotional skill building groups have increased by 50% from last year. In total, CKMHC staff provide 21 groups in 12 schools. These groups increased readiness to learn and improved the ability of students to self-regulate their emotions; resulting in decreased detentions, suspensions, and interactions with law enforcement.
- Summer and after school groups for at-risk youth expand socialemotional learning and transfer their skills and accomplishments to the home environment and family system. Successes include reduced inpatient hospitalization and decreased acting out behavior.
- An intensive therapeutic preschool program opened in September called KPREP. A collaborative partnership between CKMHC, Heartland Early Education, USD 305 and Central Kansas Cooperative in

Education worked together to share funding, staff, and training to create a program designed to help at risk 3-4 year olds who have been excluded from regular preschool and/or childcare settings due to severe behavioral problems to gain the skills needed to become emotionally, behaviorally, and academically ready for kindergarten. The KPREP program helps children identify and begin to change unsuccessful behavior patterns and attitudes so they have supports in place to be successful when they start kindergarten. KPREP is a blend of therapeutic, academic, and psychosocial training which goes beyond a day of preschool by also strengthening the family through a variety of home based therapeutic supports, parent coaching opportunities, and engaging the families' natural strengths.

- ♦ Suicide prevention presentation for Solomon teacher in-service.
- Addition of a bilingual case manager to assist with Saline County Truancy Court.

Martin Youth Center (MYC) expanded to keep up with the need

- Served 50 more youth and families this year.
- Provided 31% more hours of crisis stabilization for youth than in the previous year.
- Educated school personnel about services resulting in increased referrals to the suspension program.
 When youth are suspended from school, CKMHC can work with students to prevent future suspensions while also keeping up on classwork.

Community Education and Collaboration increased

- CKMHC now provides a behavioral health rotation for Smoky Hill Family Medicine Residency program and continues to provide internships for KU, KSU, KWU, and Bethany College students.
- Due to the increased demand for Mental Health First Aid, CKMHC doubled the number of certified trainers and increased the number of classes taught from four in 2017 to ten in 2018.
- Facilitated community education and support groups:
 - "Effects of Divorce on Children" class held monthly at CKMHC
 - Depression Support Group
 - ♦ Grief Support Groups
 - NAMI Behavioral Health Support Group (National Alliance on Mental Illness), a national advocacy group representing people affected by mental illness in the United States
- New Trainings to Improve Quality:
 - Two providers became certified as Tobacco Treatment Specialists. This smoking cessation training provides valuable tools to help people quit using tobacco.
 - ♦ Four providers obtained training on Applied Behavior Interventions for children with Autism Spectrum Disorders.
 - Staff at CKMHC attended Motivational Interviewing training to engage clients in self-recovery. This best practice teaches engagement strategies and a client-centered philosophy which addresses ambivalence to make positive change and results in readiness to achieve positive recovery.
 - Crisis and clinical practitioners completed training on the Columbia Suicide Scale which screens and measures the presence of suicidal ideation or behavior.

Highlights of 2018 contiderated and the contiderate

Better Client Care and Efficiencies

- CKMHC Client Satisfaction responses were favorable toward their mental health services.
 - ♦ 99% of Mental Health Services consumers surveyed were favorable.
 - ♦ 94% of tele-medicine clients surveyed were pleased with their tele-medicine experience at CKMHC.
 - ♦ 96% would recommend our services to a friend or family member.
- Added GeneSight testing A simple swab test that can help identify which medication classes are likely to have the best results for one's body chemistry.
- CKMHC implemented new financial software. This greatly improved our ability to build and track budgets, work more efficiently, and make better data driven decisions.
- Upgrades to our facilities allowed CKMHC to improve safety, accommodate growth, and improve professional services.
- The Abilene office expanded their office space and staff. CKMHC has increased the hours of service in Dickinson County by 13% and developed work flow efficiencies within the office.





What Makes Us Different

CKMHC is a Licensed Community Mental Health Center in the State of Kansas which makes us different in a number of ways:

- We are a non-profit organization serving as the designated local Mental Health Authority for Dickinson, Ellsworth, Lincoln, Ottawa, and Saline counties. Any revenue is reinvested to develop programs that meet the needs of the communities we serve rather than to generate profits. Examples include our school based services, community education, Martin Crisis House for youth, pharmacy and lab services, and new evidenced based practices that result in great client outcomes.
- We offer a wider, more comprehensive range of services to meet the needs of persons of all ages. In
 addition to therapy and medication management, we also provide services in the home, at schools, and
 in community locations. These include psychiatric supportive treatment, social skills groups, supported
 employment, respite, mobile crisis services, liaisons, public education, and much more.
- We are available around the clock, 24/7, to those who need assistance in our service area.
- We undergo frequent on and offsite audits and state licensing reviews to ensure quality.
- We are directed by a volunteer board who represent the communities being served. This helps us be "in tune" with the needs of, and makes us accountable to, the people we serve.
